課程大綱 Course Outline

This advanced level course in Indigenous Studies offers a Regional Focus based in Native North America (American Indian Nations), given the Instructor's longstanding field of research and teaching expertise, but will also extend transnationally to enable comparative analytics of indigeneity and settler colonialism. The course will be anchored in these two keywords as concepts to be rigorously investigated as theoretical framings, but equally rigorously investigated and tested in empirical, grounded contexts. It will offer a special emphasis on the intersection of indigeneity and Indigenous Peoples with questions of environmental justice, climate change, and eco-governance (also the Instructor's area of research expertise). To emphasize heterogeneity in Indigenous lifeworlds across regions, we will invite in guest speakers from the North American context as well as other Indigenous contexts (e.g., Mapuche in Chile; Sapmi in Norway; and First Nations in Canada, among others) to enable cross-regional analysis and reflection. Following Part 1 of the course (Key Concepts) and Part 2 (Guest Lectures/Regional Dialogues), Part 3 of the course will involve a place-based practicum in the form of a two-day field trip to Bunun buluo in Zhouxi Township to practice research skills and explore how the concepts, methods, and comparative analytics of Parts 1 & 2 of the course bear out in another (Taiwanese) context. Students will be responsible for developing two original and innovative products as their creative coursework: (a) a research output (paper/mixed media/artwork) on Indigenous Peoples/Nations in their own country/nation of origin, drawing rigorously upon theoretical, ethical, literary insights from Part 1 and 2 of the course; and (b) a collaborative contribution to a group project that emerges from the field-based learning of the trip, in Part 3.

Admission to the CIS International PhD Program OR special permission from the Instructor; no special equipment needed. Ability to dedicate one Friday and one Saturday to a research field trip (approximately one hour south of NDHU).

課程要求和教學方式之建議 Course Requirements and Suggested Teaching Methods

- 1.EMI delivery of all course materials: Instructor's lectures, class discussion, guest speeches, films, and readings.
- 2.Methods involve readings-based discussions in class; weekly lectures by the Instructor; group collaborative work and peer leadership; and independent research and writing. Special support will be offered to students as needed on a case by case basis.
- 3.Guest Lectures (3) will require GoogleMeet or WebEx platform; Guest Lectures will involve the standard NDHU lecture fee as payment.
- 4.Films (2) will require access to internet-based resources or pay-for-purchase films.
- 5.Field Trip (2-days) to Zhouxi Township, Hualien, will require use of personal

vehicles and other equipment to be provided by CIS and/or the Instructor. NDHU Insurance and administrative support will be required.
